The Annapolis-based Touchstones Discussion Project, an educational program operating nationally and internationally, has won a \$13,000 grant for its "humanizing" discussion groups inside prisons in Maryland.

Touchstones, co-founded and headed by Howard Zeiderman of Annapolis, encourages inmates to is negative," said Vaughn discuss ethical questions like those raised by classical texts from litera-

The United Thank Offering grant was awarded through the Episcopal Diocese of Maryland.

Mr. Zeiderman, a member of the faculty at St. John's College, explained that prisoners read and discuss a story like that from the Old Testament about God's order to Abraham to sacrifice his son, or a Chinese tale or a short selection from Malcolm X's writings.

- "It humanizes them," said Mr. Zeiderman, "to realize that others will listen to their ideas; it encour-

ages mutual and self-respect."

He said the Touchstones grant will help to sustain a program for 300 men in Jessup and will provide materials, training and courses for other Maryland parishes.

One inmate said the discussions taught him to avoid automatically resorting to violence to resolve con-

'In prison, almost everything else Barksdale, then 32. "Normally our disagreements would turn into fights, stabbings, that sort of thing."

Writer and MCIJ inmate Larry Bratt, in an article about Touchstones, wrote, "Our lives have been chaotic. The Touchstones idea of putting our thoughts and our lives in order became a new habit."

The grant also will free up time and materials to begin or continue the project in a jail in Charlottesville, Va., a penitentiary in central Florida, a rehabilitation Maryland and its Prison Ministry unit in the Florida Keys, a South Florida prison, and as part of a prison ministry course in Episcopal

Divinity School in Cambridge, Mass.

"Perhaps the grant will encourage others to commit time or contacts or resources to prison work," Mr. Zeiderman said.

The Touchstones Discussions Project, founded in 1984 by Mr. Zeiderman and two other faculty members, has been successful for thousands of students in hundreds of schools across the country, in senior centers and homes, for job training and in pilot programs in Haiti, China and Gaza.

In 1995 Mr. Zeiderman began to try the discussions with 10 inmates as a volunteer at the Maryland House of Corrections in Jessup. Since then an estimated 600 to 700 inmates in MCIJ in Jessup have been involved in the discussions.

Mr. Zeiderman, a member of St. Anne's Episcopal Church in Annapolis, applied for the UTO grant through the Episcopal Diocese of 19112 1918 Task Force.
