HEAD OF SCHOOL LETTER

Thank you to all who have registered for St. Martin's-in-the-Field coming school year 2011-12. Our small classes, dedicated teachers, and a spiraling curriculum all enable your children to learn and grow from grade to grade.

For the 2011-12 school year, we plan to extend our Nursery and Pre-K half-day programs from two-and-a-half hour sessions to three-hour sessions. Our morning programs will run from 9:00 a.m. to Noon, and our afternoon programs will be extended from 12:30 p.m. to 3:30 p.m. Full-Day Pre-K and Kindergarten will continue to dismiss at 3:00 p.m. If you have siblings in either class, our Mustang Club will keep them until the 3:30 dismissal. This new scheduling will give parents more time and allow your children a fuller, more relaxed schedule for their early learning.

Our school's excellent reputation and caring community are our best advertising. Please tell your friends about our gem of a school. Let your friends know about our Early 3's and 2-Day Nursery program. We will accept children with birthdates up to December 15 with the understanding that they will enter the 3-Day Nursery program the following year.

Beginning this February, we'll be implementing a new "lunch bunch" program for our Preschoolers. Morning and afternoon Nursery and Pre-K students will have the opportunity to bring their lunch and play for an hour. We hope this extra time will help parents.

I especially want to thank you for your generous support of the Annual Fund and to urge those who have not yet made their contribution to do so. As you are aware, we have not raised tuition for two years. The Board of Trustees is considering the tuition rate for next year, and as soon as their decision is made, I will let you know. We anticipate a small increase above current rates. Ours is a tuition-driven school, and rates must reflect our need for sustainability. In an effort to give our staff a raise—the first in two years—as well as to continue our educational programs, we must set a responsible level for tuition, ever-mindful that paying tuition is a sacrifice for most families.

I hope to see everybody at the annual spaghetti dinner on Friday, February 4, from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. A little flavor of warm, sunny Italy will go a long way to brighten these snowy, icy winter days.

February Virtue: Charity

The Rev. Edward Warfield will speak about the civil rights movement and marching with Martin Luther King, Jr.

Seventh- and eighth-grade students will gather on Monday, February 28th, to hear the Rev. Edward S Warfield speak about his experiences of being involved with the civil rights struggle of the 1960s and of marching with Martin Luther King, Jr. Parents are also invited to attend the talk, scheduled for 5th period, 12:40 to 1:25, in the Chapel.

Rev. Warfield has been invited to speak by Mr. Andy Smith, who teaches Health and Life Skills. Mr. Smith, who is teaching a unit on prejudice, asked Rev. Warfield to share his memories of a time when society was split along racial lines and when the words of Rev. King inspired peaceful protest against policies that reduced people of color to second-class citizens. Rev. Warfield is the father of our French teacher, Mr. Ed Warfield, and the grandfather of 7th grader Daniel Warfield. He will share his living memory of a period in our country's history that is almost unimaginable in the minds of young people today who have grown up in an integrated society, the most diverse on the face of the earth.

Rev. Warfield will speak about why he joined the struggle for civil rights and why he stayed involved. He participated in the March on Washington for Freedom and Jobs and the James Meredith March against Fear, which promoted voter registration. Both were led by King.

Rev. Warfield is currently associate director of St. Bartholomew's Episcopal Church in Baltimore . He retired after 25 years as a Human Resources officer of The Johns Hopkins University Administration. He is a retired chaplain (major) from the Maryland National Guard—136th Combat Support Hospital . He served at the Baltimore Community Action Agency under Parran Mitchell, who later became a U.S. Senator. Former clergy affiliations include the Church of the Ascension, Middle River; Church of The Messiah , Hamilton ; and St. Marks on the Hill, Pikesville . The Rev. Edward Warfield is a graduate of The Johns Hopkins University and the Episcopal Theological Seminary in Virginia .

Dr. Charles Flanagan from the National Archives visits 7th and 8th grade Touchstones Discussion groups

The words were in cursive, with "f" for "s," in the 25 facsimiles of the last pages of Abraham Lincoln's 1862 Annual Message to Congress Dr. Charles Flanagan brought with him from the National Archives when he visited 7th and 8th grade Touchstone Discussions on Thursday, January 20. To make the reading a little easier, he also brought a modern, typed transcription. In the darkest days of the Civil War, Lincoln spoke about how no one can escape history and builds to the idea of preserving the "last best hope of earth." Here is the transcription:

Fellow-citizens, we cannot escape history. We of this Congress and this administration, will be remembered in spite of ourselves. No personal significance, or insignificance, can spare one or another of us. The fiery trial through which we pass, will light us down, in honor or dishonor, to the latest generation. We say we are for the Union. The world will not forget that we say this. We know how to save the Union. The world knows we do know how to save it. We---even we here---hold the power, and bear the responsibility. In giving freedom to the slave, we assure freedom to the free---honorable alike in what we give, and what we preserve. We shall nobly save, or meanly lose, the last best, hope of earth. Other means may succeed; this could not fail. The way is plain, peaceful, generous, just---a way which, if followed, the world will forever applaud, and God must forever bless.

The questions students raised and discussed included: How does giving freedom to slaves assure freedom to the free? Why does he mention God? What does it mean to not escape history? What did he mean by "we know how to save the Union?" Dr. Flanagan spoke about the carnage of the Civil War—the statistic he cited was that roughly one out of every 16 Americans was killed—"the fiery trial" which will light us down to the latest generation. The conversation lingered on issues of justice and equality—and memory, as the National Archives is the memory center of the country.

Alraham Lincoln

After the class discussions, Dr. Flanagan met with Tracy Alexander, social studies teacher, and Susan Pistillo, language arts teacher, and Cynthia Barry, Librarian and Touchstones Discussion teacher to explore ways St. Martin's and the National Archives might connect. Dr. Flanagan is a historian who taught at the Key School for many years and was head of the Upper School Humanities team.
